SCOMING UP IN THIS MONTH'S ISSUE:

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AUTOMOTIVE TRIP TO GERMANY

Our Level 3 Automotive students travelled to Dresden to visit the phenomenal Volkswagen Transparent Factory. The students learnt about the history and transition of the factory, which was an amazing opportunity for our students.

Our students visited the Reichstag Building the historical government building in Berlin, they could see Berlin from the rooftop terrace and were able to see the Chamber of the Bundestag. The students then visited the Mall of Berlin, which featured a Tesla store. The day concluded with a visit to the most famous landmark in Berlin, the Brandenburg Gate, which was a symbol of division during the cold war but is now a national symbol of peace and unity in Germany.


The Automotive students then visited the Futurium museum and learnt about the future of mobility and creating their own future vehicles. Next was a visit to the exhibition at the Volkswagen Forum in central Berlin. Students saw a variety of iconic vehicles, key inventions, developments and events over the last 50 years. The next stop was to visit the Jewish Holocaust Memorial, which students were able to walk through and take in the impact of those killed in Second World War. This was followed by a visit to the famous golden Victory Column in Tiergarten and then finished with a great picture opportunity at the German President's stunning Bellevue Palace!

AUTOMOTIVE TRIP TO GERMANY

Students then travelled to Stiftung Automuseum in Wolfsburg to learn the history of Volkswagen models. They travelled to Munich to the BMW Welt and Museum where they were able to see different vehicles within the BMW brand and learn the history of BMW and their future plans for sustainability.

The group were then able to visit the phenomenal Porsche Museum in Stuttgart, surrounded by numerous Porsche factories. The students learned the history of Porsche, saw a huge range of vehicles and got involved in interactive activities. The students then visited Stuttgart where they saw a static military parade, and next was the Staatsgalerie where students saw a modern art display. Students then saw the former King's residence and Schlossplatz statue before heading to the famous indoor German Market.

On the student's final day in Germany, they visited the outstanding Mercedes Museum in Stuttgart. The students received a guided tour and saw all of the amazing vehicles on show. The trip was a life changing experience for the students, thank you to the Turing Scheme!

TRAVEL AND TOURISM TRIP TO VIETNAM



Our Travel and Tourism Turing group landed safely in Ho Chi Minh City and moved into the Saigon Hospitality Tourism College where they stayed for their first few days.

The students worked in soup kitchens serving meals to hospital workers, homeless and elderly people who live at the shelter. The students were able to visit the hospital itself to learn about the healthcare system in Vietnam and how important volunteers are to the hospital.

The students embarked on a walking food tour where they were able to try exotic Vietnamese foods and learn more about the culture. The group were also able to visit a local farm where they were able to attend a cooking class, learning how to cook traditional Vietnamese dishes.

The students then went on to explore the tourism industry in Ho Chi Minh where they had a bespoke city tour and visited the Pink Catholic Church, the famous Saigon Post Office and the Palace of Renunciation (Independence Palace) and tried some local specialties. The students also visited the War Remnants Museum, which allowed them to build a link to the work they were doing at the shelter. They learnt some independent living skills by moving into their apartments, where they were able to enjoy the pool.

TRAVEL AND TOURISM TRIP TO VIETNAM

Our Travel and Tourism students attended a full day tour to the Mekong Delta. During the day they rode Sampans (traditional Vietnamese boats), wearing non-la's (leaf hats) through the bamboo channels where the boat people live. They boarded Vietnamese tuk-tuks, held pythons at the snake farm, drank honey tea at the honey farm, tried tropical fruits grown on one of the holy islands of the Mekong, listened to the traditional Mekong songs deep in the delta and explored a traditional market. The group also visited coconut island and learned how coconut candy is made. Their day ended with a visit to Ninh Tràng pagoda which is a Buddhist temple near Mỹ Tho.

The students had the opportunity to set sail on a Saigon River Cruise with a full Vietnamese buffet and traditional entertainment, where they were able to try snails. Our students then visited a Rice Paper Village and at the famous Cu Chi Tunnels. They learned more about the Vietnam War, how people lived in the tunnels and the traps. The group explored the tunnels and had a fantastic final day in the jungle.

Our students spent their last days in the coastal town of Mui Ne. The group to a trip up the mountain and visited the famous sand dunes, which gave them first-hand knowledge of coastal tourism in Vietnam.

Our Animal Care students visited South Africa as part of the Turing Scheme, staying at the Umphafa Nature Reserve where they saw a variety of animals including giraffe, zebra, ostrich and plenty of antelope species.

They witnessed a mass game capture of zebra too reduce numbers and spent their downtime fishing. Students helped take down snares on the reserve left by poachers, which is a vital part of conservation on the reserve.

The students visited local schools attending a sports event, giving out donuts which had an emotional impact on the group showing the kinds of things they take for granted. The students ended their trip learning about cleaning predator boma, road maintenance, and fence patrol and were taken on a night drive.

Our Year 12 A Level Environmental Science students visited the Carlton Marshes Nature Reserve to practice various research methods used in Environmental Science, including water quality sampling, dyke dipping, succession transects and soil infiltration tests




CAMBRIDGE TRIP



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Parents - are you looking to further your education?

With Family Action, individuals with dependent children can access grants of up to \pounds 1,000 to achieve their goals.

Grants are available for the additional costs associated with undertaking a course of study such as laptops, smartphones, broadband or smartphone data, travel, books, equipment and exam fees.

Up to £500 is available for household needs such as food and utilities in recognition of the financial constraints put on a student as a result of undertaking a course of study.

You may be able to apply for a grant if you:

- are parent/carer with legal responsibility for a child/children aged under 18
- are in receipt of means tested benefits or have household income of £30,000 or less
- are studying on a course at Levels 2 to 3 in England, Northern Ireland and Wales, and at Levels 5 and 6 in Scotland
- have right of residency in the UK
